These include: Mary Eberts, "The Fight for Substantive Equality: Women's Activism and Section 15 of the *Charter of Rights and Freedoms*"; Beverley Baines, "Constitutionalizing Women's Equality Rights: There is Always Room for Improvement"; Penney Kome, "What Section 15 Has Achieved"; Senator Nancy Ruth, "Work Women Did to Make Constitutional Rights Work for Women"; and Berenice Sisler, "The Perpetuation of a Myth: The Anderson-Axworthy Affair."
